Late Planting Period Option Available for California ELS Cotton 2014 Crop Year

DAVIS, Calif., Nov. 27, 2013 – The USDA Risk Management Agency (RMA) announced that California pima cotton growers will now have a late planting period option for the 2014 crop year. This is new key feature of the extra long staple (ELS) cotton crop insurance program, and provides coverage based on a growers inability to plant up to the final planting date.

A late planting period allows growers to plant after the final planting date and still receive insurance coverage for their crop. The insurance guarantee will be reduced 1 percent for each day planted after the final planting date. The late planting period begins May 1 and ends 10 days after the final planting date.

ELS Cotton growers in Fresno, Kern, Kings, Merced and Tulare counties are encouraged to contact their crop insurance agent for more information about coverage during a late planting period. Growers who do not have an agent can get an agent listing at any USDA Service Center or by visiting the RMA website at www.rma.usda.gov/tools/agents for a list of crop insurance agents.
