Crop Insured

Alfalfa is insurable if it is grown for one or more years after the stand is established. Two types of alfalfa are insurable - pure alfalfa and alfalfa grass mixture. Below is the definition and insurability requirements for both:

Alfalfa is defined as:

- A pure stand of perennial alfalfa (including alfalfa seeded with a cover crop or nurse crop);
- At least 4 living alfalfa plants per square foot, depending on age; and
- Age up to and including 8 years.

Alfalfa grass mixture is defined as:

- Mixture of perennial alfalfa and perennial grasses; ٠
- At least 1.2 living alfalfa plants per square foot; •
- No maximum age limitations; and
- Includes all alfalfa stands that are 9 and older.

Alfalfa with stands that are at least 9 years old or with less than the required amount of plants per square foot are insurable as the alfalfa-grass mixture type as long as there are at least 1.2 living alfalfa plants per square foot. There is no maximum age limit. See a crop insurance agent for more details on age and stand requirements.

Counties Available

Forage production is insurable in Carson City, Churchill, Clark, Douglas, Elko, Eureka, Esmeralda, Humboldt, Lander, Lincoln, Lyon, Mineral, Nye, Pershing, Storey, Washoe, and White Pine counties. Forage production may be insurable in other counties by written agreement if specific criteria are met. Contact an agent for more details.

Causes of Loss

You are protected against the following:

- Adverse weather conditions;
- Failure of irrigation water supply, if caused by an • insured peril during the insurance year;
- Fire: .
- Insects or plant disease, but not damage due to • insufficient or improper application of control measures; or
- Wildlife.

Insurance Period

Insurance coverage begins on acreage with an adequate stand on the later of the date we accept your application or:

Spring Seeded.....April 15, 2014 Fall Seeded & Established Stand....October 16, 2014

Insurance ends the earliest of:

- Total destruction: •
- Removal from the windrow or the field for each • cutting:
- Final adjustment of a loss; •
- Date grazing commences on the forage crop; ٠
- Abandonment of the forage crop; or
- October 15.

Coverage Levels and Premium Subsidies

The forage production guarantee is an individual amount of annual production measured in tons of air dried alfalfa or alfalfa grass depending on the type. An individual guarantee is based on your past production. You will be asked to provide your

insurance agent 4 to 10 years of production and planting history. This history is used to determine your average yield per acre. Coverage levels range from 50 to 75 percent of your approved yield. Crop insurance premiums are subsidized as shown in the following table. For example, if you choose the 65-percent coverage level, your premium share would be 41 percent of the base premium.

Item	Percent					
Coverage Level	50	55	60	65	70	75
Premium Subsidy	67	64	64	59	59	55
Your Premium Share	33	36	36	41	41	45

Catastrophic Risk Protection (CAT) coverage is fixed at 50 percent of your approved yield and 55 percent of the price election. CAT is 100-percent subsidized with no premium cost to you. There is, however, an administrative fee of \$300 per crop per county, regardless of the acreage.

Price Election

The price used to calculate your premium and indemnity.

Alfalfa\$225	per ton
Alfalfa-Grass Mixture\$225	per ton

Loss Example

Assume an average yield of 6 tons per acre, 65-percent coverage on 100 acres, 100-percent price election of \$225, and 100-percent share.

- 6 Tons per acre average yield
- <u>x 0.65</u> Coverage level
 - 3.9 Tons per acre guarantee
- <u>- 1.0</u> Tons per acre actually produced
 - 2.9 Tons per acre loss
- x 225 Price election
 - **\$ 653** Gross indemnity per acre
